

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

We are excited about the new 2018-2019 school year at Lucas Local Schools! Going back to school after summer break brings about changes in everyone's routines. With student safety continuing to be a primary focus, we have made a few changes and enhancements to our school routines too.

Prior to the students arriving this school year, all staff members received ALICE training. The ALICE acronym stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. This

program provides preparation and planning for organizations to handle safety threats in a manner that is adaptable to various situations. Staff also engaged in Stop the Bleed training, which provides people basic training to help save lives in a bleeding emergency. Local first responders utilized our school

buildings in early August for Rescue Task Force Training. During this event, first responders practiced

emergency techniques and became familiar with our facilities in the event of an emergency. We will also be providing mental health counseling services to students this year. Students involved in this

program will receive help with coping skills, self-esteem, and managing peer relationships. We appreciate our community's involvement in our schools, and the community can help by

understanding and following our new visitor procedure. Visitors must have an appointment to gain access to the school buildings during the school day. A visitor is anyone that is not a student or staff member, and an appointment equates to a visitor providing prior notice and receiving approval for a planned visit from the school office. This new practice allows for enhanced monitoring of people

Parenting Tips

Positive Praise for your Child's Pride

Praising a child correctly is important to the development of positive behaviors.

It's a great way to encourage constructive future behavior.

When you give praise you are giving your child a feeling of positive feedback, which increases their sense of confidence, self esteem and abilities.

When you praise your child, you are pointing out the way they've acted, an action they've taken, or simply who they are.

When your child looks good, tell him so. When your child does anything that

pleases you, let him know. You should also praise a child's effort to do well, even if it doesn't come out so good in the end.

You should find something each day about your child to praise.

Be on the lookout constantly for

behaviors or actions deserving of praise, but don't be over the top about it.

Be sincere and honest in your praise.

Wait for unexpected or previously unnoticed good behavior and praise your child for it.

And when you see such action or behaviors, praise immediately so the child will know exactly what behavior

or action was deemed praiseworthy.

It's also very important to look your child square in the eye when you praise him, and reinforce the positive behavior, action or trait being praised with a gesture such as a warm

smile, a hug, scruff of the hair, or caress his face while you tell him.

Be exact, and state precisely what action, behavior or trait you find praiseworthy.

And most importantly, never directly follow praise with criticism or negative comments.

Let your child know what they did right and reward them for it before you let them know what they did wrong and punish for Omisbehaving or a misdeed.

So be sure to admire and congratulate your child and celebrate the good person they are growing into by praising their positive actions, behaviors and traits daily.

You'll be building a strong sense of self in your child and you'll grow closer as a result.

There are many people coming to the pantry that have done everything right in their lives. Got an education, gone to college, got a good job, put their kids through college and then her job downsized, down to one income in the family. Then his job downsized, down to no income in the family. They are turned down for jobs...over qualified, will want more pay down the road. They have spent their life savings and now they are in line for food, how did that happen? If you or someone you know or suspect might need help DO SOMETHING!! Tell them about us!!!

The weather is changing now and winter will be here soon. If you have some winter coats, hats, gloves etc. that are still in good shape how about sharing them with someone who has

We also accept donations of clothes that are still in good shape especially children's clothes.

You can bring them to the pantry or to one of the area Churches and they will see that the items get to the pantry.

Since we have moved to the newly renovated building of the community center, we have been able to offer more than just food to those in need. Thanks to the donations from the community of Lucas. They can shop free of charge for clothing and some household items.

Also each Saturday while our clients wait to shop for groceries they are served cookies, coffee and hot chocolate.

There are almost always one or two of the area Pastor's in attendance and working with us on distribution days. They are also there to talk and pray with anyone who needs them at that time.

Thanks to United Way and Pioneer Joint Vocational School we now have a beautiful red bookshelf filled with children's books for children to take

home, read and own. It's really fun to watch the children on Saturday mornings of the pantry go over to the bookshelf and pick a book, sit down to read it and then choose some to take home! The United Way has found that if a child can read at 3rd grade level in the 3rd grade then they are set to learn for the rest of their lives. The pantry is trying help make that happen for our children!

Lucas Branch Library

t's officially time to switch gears from summer heat to fall leaves; and with the cool autumn breeze comes a brand new school year! The Lucas branch library is here to help you with your book reports and research papers with a plethora of resources including nine branch libraries full of books, a variety of electronic resources and over 80 amazing databases using vetted and authoritative reference sources. Just ask your local librarian if you need any help finding what you need!

The library is also excited to announce several new initiatives that are transforming the way people use our resources. If you haven't heard, we completely changed our fine structure beginning in 2018, greatly reducing the daily fine amounts for movies, music and video games. Now, instead of paying \$1.25 per day late fees on movies, the fine is just .20 cents per day.

We also recently launched our "auto renewal" service. "Auto renewal" is a computerized system to automatically renew the items you have checked out, saving you potential fine costs if you forget to renew them or bring them back right on time. Of course, there are a few limitations. "Auto renewal" will not renew items that aren't eligible for renewal, including our three-day movies, speed reader books and resources that other customers have put holds on. Also, items are only eligible to be renewed three times. Still, "auto renewal" is saving our customers money every day and makes using our resources more convenient than ever!

And don't miss out on great kids programs at the Lucas branch library this fall! Did you know that we have a "Perler Party" each month for children of all ages? On the second Tuesday of the month at 4 PM, we get together to create fun and creative melted plastic designs with perler beads and irons. Also, children will want to check out our "Stuffed Animal Sleepover" on

Thursday, November 8 at 6 PM. Wear your pajamas and come enjoy a special storytime event that you'll share with your favorite stuffed animal friend. Leave your stuffed animal at the library overnight and see amazing photos of what fun your animal pal had at the library when you pick them up the next day!
